

The Seeds & The Soils

Luke 8:4-15 | Alf Halvorson preaching

Since most of our Sunday school classes and small groups are studying the Gospel of Luke this program year, I thought I would preach on the parables from Luke the rest of the fall. They are amazing stories from the mouth of our

Savior and reinforce the messages we have just received from John 4 and the Woman at the Well regarding being witnesses for Christ.

Parable comes from the Greek roots *para* and *bole*, meaning respectively "along-side" and "placed/thrown." These two Greek words together mean that "one thing is placed beside another;" the purpose of placing one thing beside another is to make clearer one of those two things. A good synonym for "parable" is "comparison." Jesus uses this technique of comparing something that is clear to the audience with something less clear to help us understand things like the Kingdom of God, our lives, the World, God's character, etc.

The context of the parable in Luke 8 is this: The synagogues are no longer open to Jesus. He's opposed by the Pharisees and the Sadducees. So He takes to the roads, hillsides, lakeshores, and villages to share His Message. He used to cast seed (The Word, God's Speech) in primarily one place. Now He spreads it more widely. Is that wise? How will it be received? And why is there different receptivity in different people? Jesus tries to answer these questions with the parable in Luke 8:4-15.

- 1. Read Luke 8:4-8. What does the sower do? Does the sower sow sparingly or extravagantly? What are the four types of soil mentioned? And what happens to each seed?
- 2. Read Luke 8:9-10. What do the disciples ask Jesus? Do you ask Jesus to help you? With what types of things and how do you ask? And what is Jesus' response? It sounds somewhat *cold* and *mean* here. How do you interpret it? (Leon Morris in his commentary on these verses says, "Parables both reveal and conceal truth: they reveal it to the genuine seeker who will take the trouble to dig beneath the surface and discover the meaning, but they conceal it from him who is content simply to listen to the story... Parables are a mine of information to those who are in earnest, but they are a judgment on the casual and the careless.")
- 3. Read Luke 8:11-15. Rarely does Jesus explain His parables, once told. I have heard it said that "an explained parable is as flat as an explained joke." Why did Jesus choose to explain this parable? According to Jesus, why are the first three soils unproductive? They seem closed-hearted, shallow-hearted, and crowded-hearted. Give examples of people today in each category. Have you ever been in those categories?
- 4. In vs 15, what does the good soil do that the other soils do not? According to vs 8, the good soil produced one hundred-fold. Where have you seen that in certain people's lives?
- 5. Would you describe yourself as hard-hearted, cold-hearted, making a half-hearted effort, kindhearted, good-hearted, warm-hearted, or some "other-hearted" right now? What, according to Jesus, tills the soil of our hearts so they are more and more receptive to the seed/Word?

Holding fast means something like "owning it," "possessing," "being devoted to," and "persevering with." How does that help you with your response to God's great gift of Himself through the Word/seed? He sows; we _____.
