# **Venturers Member Highlights**

Several years ago Connie and Paul Whelchel planted milkweed in their garden and soon the Monarch Butterflies arrived and have continued to return year after year. Vern and Betty Irwin were fascinated by this and decided to start their own "low maintenance" butterfly garden, too. It truly is as easy as getting some milkweed plants from a location that does not spray the plants with a pesticide and planting them in either large pots or in the ground.

The life cycle is simple: the Monarch Butterfly drinks the nectar from the milkweed blooms and then lays its eggs on the milkweed leaves. The eggs hatch into the yellow, black and white-striped caterpillars who devour the plant's leaves. In 9-14 days, each caterpillar crawls to a safe place nearby, hangs upside down, and sheds its skin to reveal a jade-colored chrysalis. In another 9-14 days, Monarch Butterflies emerge. This repeats year-round as the milkweed makes them distasteful to birds, lizards, and other predators and both the plant and the butterflies can survive through the Texas season changes. The Monarch Butterfly was adopted as Texas' insect in 1995!

Texas is part of a six-state initiative to turn Interstate 35 into a corridor for Monarch Butterflies on their annual migration between Canada and Mexico and will have signs calling the road "Monarch Highway." TxDOT already plants milkweed and other flowering plants along the way and restricts the use of pesticides in order to provide safe passage for the butterflies.

The opportunity to watch the Monarch-Milkweed relationship, search for the chrysalis, and marvel as the beauty emerges is a fun-filled learning experience for kids and adults alike! Betty commented that this hobby gives her great pleasure and Connie remarked that the butterflies are her "Sign of God's Love." Just be sure to place your Butterfly Garden where you can see it from a window because you will want to be able to sit and watch the action all day long!
