THE ROAD AHEAD

The Fight and the FlightMatthew 2:1-12; 13:23 | Clay Brown preaching



Introduction: Just as we're coming off the sugar high of Christmas morn, Matthew 2 makes sure we are recalibrated back into the world as we usually recognize it. Despotic leaders. Mysterious foreign visitors. Manipulation of information by the powers that be. Genocidal violence. A family fleeing persecution and death. In fact, Matthew 2 sounds like it's right out of today's headlines. It's not your usual Christmas story. Yet it reveals the depths of sin in the world Jesus comes to bring His salvation message and work.

- 1. In verses 1-2, we meet the Wise Men from the east. Much mythology has arisen regarding our mysterious visitors. What do we know directly from the passage itself? What has been added either by assumptions drawn from the text (but not necessarily good ones) or by stories and retellings of stories through the centuries? What is Biblically significant about these visitors, and why is their presence important here?
- 2. In verses 3 and following, Herod the Great is a man on a mission. Unfortunately his mission is in the worst tradition of personal sociopathy and political intrigue. Why is he concerned about the Wise Men's appearance? What does he fear most? How does he attempt to play the system to get the outcome he desires?
- 3. Describe the Wise Men's encounter with Jesus in verses 9-12. Who is missing from the meeting? What gifts are given? What might these gifts represent? What use might these gifts possess for the future? How do the Wise Men counter Herod's moves?
- 4. Why do the Holy Family go to Egypt in verses 13-15? Describe the process Joseph, Mary, and Jesus go through as God reveals to them what they must do. What similarities do they have with other refugees in past centuries and in ours?
- 5. Herod is a pragmatist above all else. If a threat exists to his rule, he must neutralize it. To what horrific extreme does he go in verses 16-18? What Biblical prophecy does Herod's depravity fulfill? What examples of like cruelty and moral blindness do we see in today's world?
- 6. After Herod dies, the way is clear for the Holy Family's return in verses 19-23. Why does the family wind up in the no-name village of Nazareth, in the no-name province of Galilee? What does being raised in this location say about the person and work of Jesus?
- 7. What pattern of divine guidance do we observe consistently from beginning to end of this passage? Are there places in the world today where this sort of guidance is happening regularly, according to reports? What cultural limitations do we often place on how we may receive God's guidance today? How do you receive God's guidance, day in and day out?


