Passage (New Revised Standard Version)

39 One of the criminals who were hanged there kept deriding[a] him and saying, "Are you not the Messiah?[b] Save yourself and us!" **40** But the other rebuked him, saying, "Do you not fear God, since you are under the same sentence of condemnation? **41** And we indeed have been condemned justly, for we are getting what we deserve for our deeds, but this man has done nothing wrong." **42** Then he said, "Jesus, remember me when you come into[c] your kingdom." **43** He replied, "Truly I tell you, today you will be with me in Paradise."
